ATTORNEY MARTSON: Thank you, Mr.

President. The first item for consideration can be found on page two of your agendas and is a proposed rulemaking comes from the Bureau of Wildlife Management.

Based on current scientific findings, changes to accept the nomenclature, the Commission is proposing to amend Section 133.21 to update the common and scientific names of Northern Goshawk to American Goshawk on the Commonwealth's list of endangered birds.

Formerly considered a single species,

Goshawks in Europe and North America were split into
separate species in the 64th supplement to the

American Ornithological Society's checklist of North

American Birds due to genetic and behavioral
differences.

The European species, Northern

Goshawk, retained the original common and scientific names and the North American species, American goshawk, received new common and scientific names.

These changes do not affect protection or management of Goshawks within this Commonwealth but update Pennsylvania's list to reflect the current taxonomic resolution of each species, maintaining the agency's science-based approach to wildlife management.

the Commonwealth's minimum age eligibility threshold

for a general class falconry permit from 18 years of

age to 16 years of age. Under 50 C.F.R. Section

21.82, Federal regulations set the minimum age 1 2 eligibility threshold at 16 years of age. 3 While states cannot go below this 4 threshold, they can raise the threshold higher. 5 Pennsylvania historically maintained the minimum age eligibility threshold for a general class falconry 6 7 permit at 18 years of age. The Commission has not identified a significant biological or safety 9 concern that would necessitate maintaining the 18 10 years of age threshold. 11 As a result, the Commission is 12 proposing to amend Section 147.103 to decrease the 13 minimum age eligibility threshold for a general class falconry permit from 18 years of age to 16 14 15 years of age. 16 PRESIDENT FORADORA: Do we have a motion on the item? 17 18 COMMISSIONER KNICK: So moved. 19 COMMISSIONER FREDERICKS: Second. 20 PRESIDENT FORADORA: Motion and 21 second. ATTORNEY MARTSON: The next item for consideration can be found on page five of your agendas and is an adopted rulemaking from the Bureau of Wildlife Protection.

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission at its April 13, 2024 meeting amended Section 147.805 to allow a mentor to accompany up to three of any combination of mentored youth or mentored adults at a time.

This maximum limit of three would also include any junior hunter present and otherwise requires accompaniment by the mentor under Section 2711(a)(8) of the code, when the person is also serving as a mentor. This change will not expand the one lawful hunting device limit for mentored youth, but it will allow mentored adults and junior hunters to possess their own hunting implement while accompanied by a common mentor. This amendment is now before the Commission for final adoption.

\$160,000 lump sum, with the Game Fund obligation limited to \$40,000 and the remaining \$120,000 funded through a Section 6 non-traditional grant.

The Western Pennsylvania Conservancy is offering for sale 660 more or less acres of land in Cherry and Clay Townships, Butler County, adjoining State Game Land Number 95. The offer is contingent upon WPC successfully closing on its acquisition of the property.

The option price is \$1,165,344 lump sum with \$291,336 being paid from the Commission's restricted account representing funds from third-party commitments for compensation of habitat

and recreational losses which occurred on State game lands from previously approved projects.

Acquisitions using this account may exceed \$400 per acre. The remaining \$874,008 will be funded through a Section 6 grant. The property will be subject to deed restrictions pursuant to this funding source. The property is mostly forested. Findlay Run flows through the property, as well as an unnamed tributary to Slippery Rock Creek.

Inventory review indicates the presence of a federally endangered species in the vicinity of this property. A heron rookery located on the freshwater pond on the property provides a unique wildlife habitat feature. Access is via Pry Road, West Sunbury Road, Kuzma Road and Wolford Road.

Quickly. So this is our second acquisition of the day. Both of them I think, have shown PNDI hits for federally listed and endangered species within the vicinity of that property. I think that's a testament to your folks and how they are really putting a laser focus on where they can acquire properties that make sense within our strategic plan and for wildlife value. It's not just a willy-nilly land grab here and there.

I mean, for us as a State agency with the responsibilities that we have for wildlife to look the other way when an opportunity like this presents itself it would be a miss on our part. So man, what an opportunity. Thank you.

MR. GUSTAFSON: If I can add, Commissioner, thank you for those comments. I think

1 you'll note the last two acquisitions reference a 2 Section 6 grant. That is Section 6 of the 3 Endangered Species Act. This is the first time 4 we've applied for and then granted funds through 5 that source. A testament to our new land 6 acquisition specialist attending a training with the 7 feds, being made aware, working with partners and getting those funds to make these acquisitions 9 possible. As you mentioned, it's really that laser 10 focus of what we should be doing as an agency and 11 take great pride in that. So thank you. 12 PRESIDENT FORADORA: Other questions 13 or comments? The Nature Conservancy is offering 1,153 more or less acres of land in Northampton

Township, Somerset County, near State Game Land
Number 82. The offer is contingent upon TNC
successfully closing on this acquisition of the
property. The Game Commission, committed to
providing up to \$1,875,000 towards the acquisition
and applied to the United States Fish and Wildlife
Service for the use of Pittman-Robertson funds to
acquire the property.

The required 25 percent state match for the PR grant will come from the game plan. The property will be subject to deed restrictions pursuant to the funding sources. The property contains critical and unique habitat, including the headwaters of Brush Creek, a high-quality coldwater fishery. The property is also within the Allegheny Front Important Bird Area. Access is from Ackerman Road.

The Commission must provide the
United States Fish and Wildlife Service award amount
to the Nature Conservancy from the Commission's
restricted revenue account, set up through treasury
for other cost-sharing funds, and then directly
accept the Federal reimbursement amount back into
the restricted revenue account.

This has the double benefit of being

question about the timber arrangement. Is there some kind of arrangement already set up?

MR. GUSTAFSON: So there is. It references a management agreement along with that ten-year timber preservation. Bingaman & Son has been a phenomenal partner in this project that has spanned a couple of years now. If you remember back to September, we acquired the 650 acres immediately to the north of this piece. That was again part of a similar arrangement. That was phase one. This is phase two.

While they retain the rights to harvest timber in the agreement, we are working through a ten-year plan with them so that we can get in ahead of time, conduct herbicide operations to eliminate invasive vegetation to ensure that the regenerating habitat is to our desired condition.

We've also retained all the conifer species and some of the soft mass-producing species.

And while we were actually on a site visit with the folks from the Open Space Institute, we observed an area near about 300 acres that had native tamarack, native red pine, hemlock, white pine, and a really unique Palustrine conifer forest that will be intact. They will not be harvesting

through those areas.

They're going to maintain some riparian buffer areas for us, and they've already been partnering with our field staff to set the plan for how we would manage this in the future, should you all approve of this action.

PRESIDENT FORADORA: Any other
questions for Dave?

COMMISSIONER KOPPENHAFER: Yeah, real quick. 1,747 acres that has an option price of just over \$3.2 million and you brought together partners that reduced our costs by \$1.2 million.

COMMISSIONER KOPPENHAFER: Can you expand on that, tell us how that came to fruition?

MR. GUSTAFSON: How this whole project started, the phase one, phase two, was actually Bingaman & Son Lumber approached the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, and said, we're interested in acquiring this 2,000-plus acre tract of land. We don't want to hold the land in perpetuity, and we would really like to see it end up in the Game Commission's hands. Can you help us in that endeavor?

So Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation kind of became the linchpin to help us start building partnerships. I'd also note immediately to the south of the yellow-colored property here, is a large piece of property that is under an easement by the Nature Conservancy. So more conserved land is directly to the south. That's why the Nature Conservancy has an interest in this.

Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation
obviously because Game Lands 14 was the stronghold
of the last of our elk herd that repopulated the
State decades ago. So this is a really high profile
spot. The Open Space Institute was very interested
in protecting the conservation value of this high
elevation headwaters as a functioning sustainable
forest habitat into the future.

So lots of partners with converging interests and everybody willing to "pony up" some money to be able to make this happen. So this is a true testament to partners working together, that all have their own specific interests that can converge in one place in time.

The option price is \$86,000 lump sum to be paid from the Commission's restricted account representing funds from third-party commitments for compensation of habitat and recreational losses which occurred on State game lands from previously approved projects. Acquisitions using this account may exceed \$400 per acre.

Natural Lands' acquisition of this property is contingent upon them receiving funding through the United States Fish and Wildlife Service Highlands Conservation Act. Covenants, conditions and restrictions associated with this funding will be required to accept the property.

This game land is heavily used by hunters and non-hunters, and this acquisition would increase the opportunity for these groups to enjoy outdoor wildlife-related recreational pursuits.

Access is a 50-foot Right-of-Way from Furnace Hills Pike.

Because the HCA funds are payable to the Commonwealth only as a reimbursement, the Commonwealth determined the most expeditious way to move forward is for the Commission to accept a subaward for the Federal funds from DCNR, provide the HCA award amount to Natural Lands from the

Commission's restricted revenue account set up through treasury for other cost-sharing funds, and then directly accept the HCA Federal reimbursement amount back into the restricted revenue account. This has the double benefit of being efficient as well as ensuring Federal dollars can be tracked directly to the acquisition project as intended by the HCA.

The net effect to the restricted revenue account for the game fund is zero dollars. To accomplish this, the Commission must approve the use of the restricted revenue account, payment from the account and the subsequent acceptance of the Federal HCA funds to be deposited into the account.

I think that's a testament to our partners and what they can bring to the table. You might imagine the appraisal price on the property like this down there. It's north of \$2 million. So for our partners to be able to come in and take our

share of that, for the sportsmen to pay \$86,000 is a pretty monumental lift. And we appreciate Natural Lands being part of this and helping us out with this.

The proposed tract containing approximately 3,458.98 more or less net acres located in Tioga Township, Tioga County.

JKLM will access the 3,458.98-acre reserves from its current and planned drilling operations on adjacent areas off State Game Land 37, by horizontal drilling with no additional surface use or disturbance to State Game Land Number 37.

The Commission negotiated the proposed terms of the agreement with JKLM to prudently develop the Commission's oil and gas reserve and simultaneously protect the wildlife resources and recreational use of State Game Land Number 37.

The terms of the agreement are a 10-year, paid-up, non-surface use oil and gas agreement, a \$3,000 per net oil and gas acre bonus payment, and a 16.5 percent royalty for all oil, gas

and other liquids or condensates produced and sold from the proposed tract.

The bonus payment will be made in annual installments in the first three years of the primary term with 34 percent due the first year, 33 percent due the second year and 33 percent due the third year.

The total bonus to be paid will be \$10,376,940. The first payment of \$3,528,159.60 will be due within 60 days of execution of the agreement. The second and third installments will be due annually on the anniversary date(s) of the agreement. All bonus and rental payments will be deposited into the Commission's restricted account for the future purchase of wildlife habitats, lands or other uses incidental to hunting, furtaking and wildlife resource management.

Future royalties owed to the Commission will be deposited into the game fund.

Oil and gas development will be regulated by the Commonwealth's Oil and Gas regulations and the Commission's non-surface use oil and gas cooperative agreement.
